Incidents of note in the area - 01/11/2018-30/11/2018:

Call from person stating they received a phonecall from someone purporting to be from BT who stated they had hacked their internet. This was in fact impossible as they had no internet at their house. Referred to action fraud to obtain the full circumstances of the incident.

Vehicle pursuit from Scalby Road onto Barrowcliffe. Vehicle located and male driver ran off. Unable to trace him but the vehicle was seized by Officers. No insurance on the vehicle.

Report from a member of the public of a vehicle in the middle of the forestry with its engine running. Police attend and locate a distressed male. His vehicle had become stuck and he was struggling with his mental health. He was helped back home and put in touch with the relevant agency to obtain further support.

One vehicle road traffic collision at Ravenscar. Car did not negotiate a sharp bend and went through a dry stone wall. No offences committed by the driver.

Male under the influence of drugs smashed a window to a flat. He was apprehended and dealt with by Police. The victim did not wish for him to be prosecuted but he was spoken to by Police and is paying for the damage. This has to be within 28 days otherwise he will be arrested and charged.

0630hrs - Report of male under the influence of drink/drugs trying car door handles in Newby. Officers attend and arrest male for 'vehicle interference'. Male charged with Criminal Damage and at court on 4th December.

Other News

Two joint agency off-road patrols are planned in December. This is to combat the off-roading groups and fly-tipping in the rural area.

PCSO Ria Lockey is now a wildlife Officer after attending a recent training course. She was one of 24 Officers who attended the recent week long course.

Community Payback – (previously Community Service)

******Please consider this for any relevant areas within your area******

You will be aware that many of the people we deal with receive community orders from the courts, but were you aware that your local community groups, projects and parish councils can access the work they do?

Magistrates or judges can sentence offenders to carry out anything from 40 to 300 hours of unpaid work as part of their order. Community Payback must include a minimum of a day's work – lasting at least seven hours – once a week.

People can also be sentenced to intensive Community Payback orders, which mean they must complete 28 hours of work every week.

Across Humberside, Lincolnshire and North Yorkshire people on probation complete roughly half a million hours of Community Payback every year.

All projects combine hard work and the chance for the participant to develop skills. It is also a punishment as the individual is giving up their time to carry out the work.

Community Payback projects vary from maintaining the grounds of parks; churches; cemeteries; local football; cricket and sports clubs; schools and parks through to helping to run clubs for the elderly and vulnerable adults with learning difficulties. In addition, offenders who have been rigorously risk assessed can also be placed directly with charities and community groups, such as helping to run charity shops.

Members of the public can nominate projects for Community Payback teams to complete.

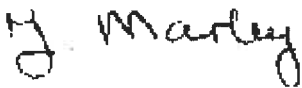
SUBJECT: Update on highway, footpath & other matters since 14/11/18

SUBJECT: Precept 2019/20.

It is now time for Council to set its precept for the 2019/20 financial year.

Councillors may recall that in previous years the external auditors (PKF Littlejohn LLP) drew members attention to the high level of reserves held. Accordingly the precept for the current financial year was reduced by £10,000 and the shortfall in income is being financed from reserves.

On current projections, it is anticipated that Council will end the financial year with a deficit of income over expenditure in the region of £11,231. This deficit is to be funded from reserves.

A loan of £10,000, to be funded from reserves and repaid within a 10 year term, has been promised to Scalby Sports Association (SSA). I have assumed the loan will be paid out during the current financial year and repayments will commence in 2019/20. This being the case, it is anticipated Council will start the new financial year with immediately accessible reserves in the region of £61,000 (a decrease of £32,000 on the same time last year) and long term reserves in the region of £22,000.

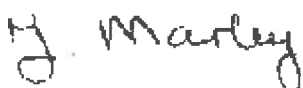
As members are aware, reserves are parishioner's money and should not accrue excessively in order to form a safety net for Council. Unless significant future expenditure is planned then a general guideline is that reserves equate to one year's running costs.

In order to continue bringing reserves to a more realistic figure it is suggested that Council increases its precept for 2019/20 by £1,250 and then by £1,000 a year for the following seven financial years; taking into account the SSA loan repayments, this will have the effect of bringing short term reserves down to around £45,000 by financial year 2026/27 while at the same time ensuring any increase in precept is gradual.

If Council was to set a precept of £30,300 for financial year 2019/20, this would result in a council tax cost of £8-19 for a Band D property (an increase of 27 pence on the current financial year).

RECOMMENDATIONS:-

1. Council sets a precept of £30,300 for financial year 2019/20.
