March 2022

There were 57 incidents reported in your area during March.

04/03/2022 22:43 – A single vehicle RTC was reported on the Coastal Road near to the camping and caravanning club. Officers attend and locate a car in a hedge. The driver was arrested on suspicion of drink and drug driving and later released whilst we await the result of bloody analysis.

05/03/2022 13:03 – A two vehicle RTC occurred on Scalby Road in Newby. Two vehicles carried out a similar manoeuvre which resulted in a clash of wing mirrors. The drivers spoke with one another and exchanged their details.

06/03/2022 00:00 – A resident received a scam text from 07551 426348 purporting to be from NHS Test and Trace. The text stated this person was a contact for someone with covid and they could click on a link to order their PCR test. The text and link appeared very convincing which led the resident to enter their bank details and buy a kit for £1.80. The very small amount convinced the resident to enter their details. Thankfully, the fraud was spotted very quickly by the victim who took action to freeze their cards to prevent a fraud. Please be aware of this scam and encourage and vulnerable or elderly friends and relatives to delete any similar messages.

07/03/2022 00:00 – A resident received 10 phone calls in 15 days from a male stating he worked for Sky TV Maintenance. The male offered them discount on services if the victim paid £98 on a credit card, they were very aggressive and threatening and it was the same person each time who used the name of Adam. 'Adam' threatened the victim with termination of Sky TV. Sky were contacted who confirmed they have had other similar calls of this "Sky maintenance withdrawal threat".

16/03/2022 12:18 – A male acting furtively was stopped by Officers on patrol on Hackness Road. The male had a small quantity of Cannabis on their person so was dealt with for this offence.

16/03/2022 16:56 – A sign advertising a local business was stolen from near to the toilets on Raven Hall Road between 1300hrs and 1500hrs on Wednesday 16th March.

22/03/2022 15:57 – A resident received a scam call from someone providing the name DC Liam HANWORTHY from Hammersmith Police, and then later in the call a Superintendent SHELBY from New Scotland Yard. This scammer stated there had been a serious fraud on the victims account. They advised the victim to transfer £7,000 to another account. Thankfully, the victim was wise to their attempts, contacting first the Police, then their bank who advised no money had been taken and it was in fact a scam. The Police will NEVER phone up randomly and ask for any of your bank details, THIS WILL NEVER CHANGE. If someone phones up stating they are from the Police and asking you for bank details, please put the phone down immediately.

25/03/2022 22:24 – Four dead foxes have been found on land off Limestone Lane. This matter is under investigation.

26/03/2022 07:14 – A deer ran out into the side of a van driving on The Coastal Road at Burniston, the deer ran off and could not be found. Whilst this is not a reportable RTC, if you hit a deer are unable to move it off the road, please contact us to prevent any further collisions.

During March, local Officers dealt with a number of traffic offences in response to complaints from your local Councillors and other residents. Between 3rd March and 21st March, 14 offences of a "Motor Vehicle failing to comply with Solid White Lines" were dealt with by means of issuing a Traffic Offence Report (TOR). This TOR is sent by the Officer to the Traffic Bureau at HQ who decide on a course of action. All 14 offences were witnessed on the crawler lane on A170 at Wykeham/Ruston. Two Mobile Phone offences were also reported from the same location in March, these were also dealt with by issuing a TOR. These mini traffic Operations will be carried out on a continuing basis across by your local team across your whole Policing area. The areas we have covered since February are Burniston, Cloughton, Crossgates, Wykeham, Snainton, East and West Ayton.

We received 6 report of concern for safety of an individual in your ward area during March. These incidents invariably relate to people in distress. We work closely with the Street Triage Mental Health Team at Cross Lane who carry Police radios with them, we also have support from Mental Health professionals who work in our control room. This is sadly becoming an increasing trend at present but we always ensure the people receive the best help available at the time and refer them to other agencies. If necessary, they are referred into the weekly meeting we have with other agencies from around the Borough where we can discuss courses of action to provide best support.

During March we dealt with 758 incidents across the area as a whole, a breakdown of these follows (not inclusive of all incidents): -

- 7 injury/death RTCs.
- 18 damage only RTCs.
- 33 road related offences, drink/drug driving, no insurance/license/dangerous driving/speeding etc...
- 55 reports of suspicious circumstances.
- 13 missing persons.
- 3 firearms incidents.

- 7 Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme – *commonly referred to as 'Clare's Law' The Scheme was introduced to set out procedures that could be used by the police in relation to disclosure of information about previous violent and abusive offending by a potentially violent individual to their partner where this may help protect them from further violent and abusive offending.*
- 45 domestic incidents/violence.
- 99 concern for safety incidents.
- 3 civil disputes.
- 4 animal incidents
- 12 highway disruptions
- 85 violence crimes.
- 11 sexual offences.
- 17 thefts.
- 1 stolen motor vehicles.
- 19 fraud or forgery.
- 4 drug offences.
- 14 criminal damages.
- 5 dwelling or commercial burglaries.
- 1 auto crimes.
- 77 anti-social behaviour reports.

If an incident of Anti-Social Behaviour occurs which you would like Police to deal with then please report this as soon as possible after the event to allow Officers the best chance to deal with the culprits. Please do not wait until next time you happen to bump into an Officer or Parish Councillor. It allows us to make connections with other incidents and deal with individuals for patterns of behaviour rather than incidents in isolation. It does not matter if no suspects have been seen or cannot be identified; we may have this reported on another nearby incident and be able to link them.

Community Safety Advice April 2022

The Partners within Operation Cracker are holding events during the summer months in order to raise awareness to the Cardiac Health Awareness Campaign and you will see displays at Roadshows, Fairs and Shows throughout the summer.

An Operation Cracker spokesman has said, "Police in Filey and Eastfield have teamed up with all three emergency services to launch a cardiac arrest awareness campaign encouraging local businesses, schools and sports facilities to install life-saving defibrillators accessible 24hrs a day. The initiative which is part of Operation Cracker is supported by North Yorkshire Fire and Rescue, Yorkshire Ambulance Service, Yorkshire Air Ambulance, Scarborough Mountain Rescue team, Crimestoppers UK and the National Farmers' Union".

Even though I have personal "experience" in matters cardiac, it's not always easy to know what to do in the case of someone having a heart attack because of one thing – you panic when you first witness an attack. It's human nature, it's normal but you must somehow learn to control that panic if you are to help the person in need.

This last year or two has seen a lot of changes; heart health is and always has been important but due to lockdown, it's even more important now that we keep our heart healthy. Not all heart attacks are clutchy-chest and grimacing like you see in the movies; a heart attack (from information taken directly from the NHS website on cardiac health) can be gentle – like indigestion or a feeling of "not feeling right" in yourself; feeling tired all the time - you may not even know you have had one until the paramedics put on the ECG machine.

The heart is a muscle that just happens to pump blood round your body to your organs and brain; interruption to that blood flow can cause angina, strokes and more so the quicker you call 999 the better for (hopefully) full recovery. An attack is different to a cardiac arrest and it's very important to know the difference between the two.

From information taken directly from the NHS website on cardiac health - an attack is, as previously described and with treatment or an operation can be rectified if caused by a blood clot or other blockage, or you can be placed on medication (for angina); cardiac arrest is when the heart stops and unless there is action taken then the person can die – that's the difference.

Heart Attack symptoms can feel like

- Chest pain – a bit like tightness of the chest, squeezing across your chest; pains in other parts of your body spreading from the chests and arms, neck, jaw, back, tummy
- Feeling light-headed or dizzy
- Sweating
- Feeling sick (nausea) or being sick (vomiting)
- An overwhelming feeling of anxiety (like a panic attack)

- Coughing or wheezing
- The chest pain can be severe, but some people may only experience minor pain, feeling like indigestion
- Women are most likely to feel shortness of breath, feeling or being sick and back or jaw pain

Call 999 immediately if you think someone might be having a heart attack. The faster you act, the better their chances.

Through Operation Cracker Partners, look out for the following: -

- **4 June Ayton Gala** - Cardiac arrest awareness campaign roadshow
- **12 -15 July Great Yorkshire Show**- NFU involvement via agricultural shows (including GYS) and a feature article in the NFU magazine and a feature on their website
- **7 August - Eastfield Festival** - Eastfield Community Centre
- **21 August - Filey Emergency Services Day** on Clarence Drive Sports field, Filey

Also including

- Crimestoppers Rural Campaign early this summer
- Distribution of cardiac awareness literature
- Community defibrillator demonstrations run by Yorkshire Ambulance and Fire and Rescue Service responders as well as
- North Yorkshire Police creation of posters/literature

So, keep an eye out for an event coming near you and attend if you can and learn where the defibrillator is where you live – it might just save your life or a life of someone you care about.

Also, British Heart Week is 7 – 15 June 2022 so watch out for information, leaflets, training sessions, Roadshow, Fairs and Shows.

Cloughton Estate – Hackness Road Allotments Rent Review

As you may be aware, the Duchy of Lancaster has deferred rent reviews since the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic. However, as restrictions begin to ease, we will be resuming standard business practices, which means that the review for your lease of Hackness Road Allotments, is now due.

For your records, the rent was last reviewed on 25th March 2016. The previous review being deferred.

I therefore propose that the existing rent of £840 per annum is increased to £960 per annum (plus VAT if applicable) with effect from the 25th March 2022.

The agreement states that the licence fee is to be paid half yearly in arrears on 28th September and 24th March each year.

If you are happy to proceed on this basis, I would be grateful if you could please sign both enclosed memoranda returning them to this office to completed on behalf of the Landlord, we will return one for your records. The next rent review will be due in three years' time on the 25th March 2025.

SUBJECT: Review of the effectiveness of Internal Control

Introduction

Regulation 5(1) of the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 requires this Council to 'undertake an effective internal audit to evaluate the effectiveness of its risk management, control and governance processes, taking into account public sector internal auditing standards or guidance'.

An effective system of control has three elements

1. Identification of the Potential Risk (Risk Management)
2. Controls of Procedures in place to mitigate the risks identified (Control Systems)
3. System for testing the adequacy of internal controls (Internal Audit).

1. Risk Management

The Financial Risk Assessment is updated annually.

Council's assets are inspected annually. The information obtained in the inspection enables Council to plan for any maintenance work required and to update the Asset Register.

3. Internal Audit: (of which there are 4 areas to consider)

- Scope: The Internal Audit covers the internal control processes identified by Council as well as matters directly related to the Annual Return.
- Independence: The Internal Auditor has direct access to the RFO and reports in their own name to Council. The auditor has no other role within the Council and the reporting is unbiased and objective.
- Competence: The internal audit is carried out by someone with a good knowledge of local government accounting practices as they apply to town and parish councils.
- Relationships: The Clerk is consulted on the internal audit arrangements.

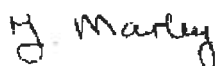
The Internal Auditor has access to Council's documentation of its internal control processes, financial risk assessment, health and safety risk assessments, insurance schedule, asset register, Standing Orders, Financial Regulations, Accounts and policies, as well as to previous Annual Returns and relevant information. These inform the internal audit.

The internal audit is an opportunity for discussion about new developments in the audit service, risk management and corporate governance.

The internal audit is relevant for the completion of the Statement of Assurance at Section 1 of the Annual Return as well as being essential to the completion of the Annual Internal Audit Report.

2. Council confirms that for financial year 2021/22 there was in place a sound system of internal control, including arrangements for the preparation of the Accounting Statements

The title Parish is not commensurate with our population or what we want to achieve and indicates we are smaller than we actually are.

- Assist in truly identifying the council's true status in negotiations with other organisations including a devolution.
- Counter the suggestion by our MP that we should consider being part of a newly formed Scarborough Town Council. He excluded Eastfield from this because it is a Town Council.
- Support funding applications.

I am not proposing that the style of Council changes and therefore the role of Chairman will not be replaced by the role of Mayor.
