98/23.1 **Police:-** Reports for Newby and Scalby for May incidents were tabled at the meeting. Additional information given by PC636 Flinton on Newby items – the vehicle on Greylands Park Drive had now been removed and speed checks would continue in the vicinity of Moor Lane, Red Scar Drive and Hackness Road.

At this point (7.10pm) PC636 Flinton left the meeting.

98/23.2 **North Yorkshire Unitary Council:-** Cllr. Sharma reported action was imminent on the longstanding issue with the hedge on the corner of Dunwell Avenue. Cllr. Bastiman reported 1] background work on a new Local Plan had been started, 2] improvements to Scarborough West Pier were to go ahead, 3] the selection process for an elected Mayor was about to begin, 4] work on the Cinder Track was to restart.

99/23.1 **Received & noted** written report by Helen King (tabled at meeting).

99/23.2 Update by Chairman and Clerk on matters dealt with under delegated powers:- 1] N. Yorks. & Cleveland Forum [Minute 74/23 refers] was not active due to a lack of funding but North Yorkshire Council was part of the North East Coastal Group.

- 100/23.2 **Noted** 1] a letter received from Robert Goodwill MP regarding issues raised by a parishioner about traffic speed and alleging Moor Lane does not have a speed limit in place and 2] Clerk's initial response *[both circulated with agenda]*. Clerk updated members – the VAS data from Red Scar Lane showed an 85th speed percentile of 39.9 mph so the area had been referred to the Police for enforcement. Moor Lane was in a 30mph zone but no columns were adapted to hold a VAS sign – initial enquiries suggested the cost to do this would be £200-£300/column. Unitary Councillor Sharma offered to provide some funding from his Locality budget for Moor Lane and Unitary Councillor Bastiman offered to provide some funding from his Locality Budget for a site on the A171 near the Rugby Club. Chairman/Clerk to liaise with Highways & Cllrs. Sharma and Bastiman.

June 2023

There were 88 incidents reported in your area during June.

23/06/2023 - Police are appealing for witnesses following a fatal collision near to Forge Valley Wood on Seavegate, East Ayton. The collision happened on Friday 23rd June at around 8.40pm near to the Scout hut and the Old Man's Mouth car park and involved red Vauxhall Corsa which was travelling in the direction of East Ayton. Very sadly the driver, an 18-year-old man, died at the scene.

Officers are appealing for any witnesses to the collision, or anyone who saw the vehicle prior to the collision to contact them. They'd particularly like to speak to any drivers in the area who may have captured dash cam footage. Anyone who has information which would help the investigation is asked to email ben.prosser-waite@northyorkshire.police.uk or dial 101 select option 2 and ask to speak to Traffic Constable Ben Prosser-Waite. 01/06/2023 17:00 – A report was received from Scalby Road in Burniston that a male was going door to door stating he was from prison, trying to turn his life round and selling random items such as tumble dryer balls and dishcloths. He didn't want paying in cash, he wanted paying into a bank account which was authorised by his supervisor in a car round the corner. An Officer attended and located the male – he did not have a pedlars license. The bag of items was seized and the male was put on the bus back to Middlesbrough.

09/06/2023 22:42 – A deer was struck and killed at speed on A170 north of Cloughton. The airbags deployed on the vehicle which was unmovable due to damage. Officers attended and assisted with recovery of the vehicle.

14/06/2023 20:11 – A report was received of 10 dozen eggs being stolen from a roadside stall in Suffield. A red BMW was seen acting in a suspicious manner prior to the theft. Please report any information and quote incident 12230109061.

22/06/2023 10:48 – A three vehicle RTC was reported on A171 north of Cloughton. Officers attended and helped to manage and clear the scene.

26/06/2023 15:33 – A report of a dwelling burglary having occurred between 1100hrs and 1500hrs was received from Station Road in Scalby. Uniformed Officers initially attended and this is now being investigated by CID.

Change to front office opening times - Due to staffing difficulties, the front counter hours of both Filey and Eastfield Police Station are changing for the next 3 months. Filey will be open 0900-1500 every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Eastfield will be open 0900-1500 every Tuesday and Thursday.

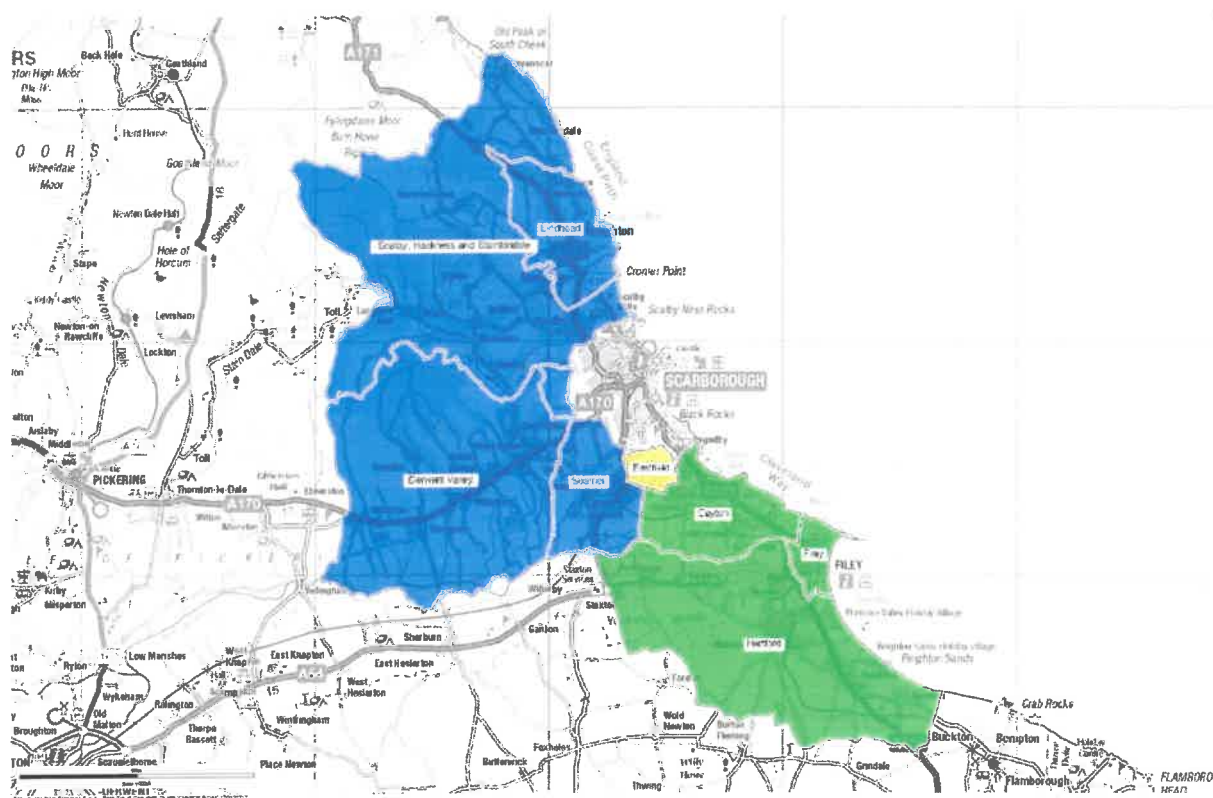

Community Safety Advice – July 2023



We all know to keep our windows and doors locked while we are at the back of our property – goes without saying.

But what about when you go away on holiday?

Have a check list

- Cancel newspapers.
- Cancel milk (if delivered)
- Ensure any scheduled deliveries of orders don't get delivered while away or work out alternative destinations by asking a neighbour if they will take delivery for you
- Lock all windows and secure doors (including outbuildings).
- If you have a system fitted, ensure you mobile is synchronised to accept home security updates while you are away
- Make a list before you go away of all the documents you need to take with you.

Your Property and Security

Well, it is that time of year again where we are all busy bees outside our properties in the garden either weeding or painting the fence or having a barbeque with family and friends so it's time for reminders to keep your valuables out of sight and secure.

It's a regular dinner meal for the would-be thief if we let our guard down and leave windows and doors wide open to "blow away the cobwebs" – but, that's playing into their hands, and if there are a lot of people milling about (if you have a barbeque for example) it not possible to keep tabs on everyone - so we must be careful and be security conscious.

So, look at your property like it is the layers of an onion (or a rose if you prefer) and start on the outside/fencing. Are your gates secure, have you holes in your fence or hedge? If you have a hole, then try to "plug" it with something you don't use as this is leaving yourself vulnerable if you don't (thieves can crawl through a gap in a hedge to gain access to your property).

Outbuildings next – are your locks secure? Do you have CCTV pointing at the access of your property (being careful not to break any regulations!) and are the things inside your outbuildings secure? If not, invest in a padlock or two



With diesel being the price that it is and thefts on the rise, we need to tighten up security on the oil tanks and bowsers!

- Placing lockable caps on your tank's fill point and inspection chamber is the easiest method to prevent fuel from being siphoned out of the tank's access points. **This is very important as instances of diesel theft are increasing in our area.**
- Consider protecting vulnerable hoses with stronger casing to ensure they are harder to cut by a thief.
- Most electronic fuel tank monitors can be fitted to most tanks. Some oil monitors even can set off an audible alarm if the oil level in tank were to suddenly drop below the expected level or if the system detects considerable tank movement or vibration that may be caused because of tank drilling or spiking.

- Fuel dye can act as a deterrent as the Police can easily identify if fuel has stolen. Criminals will be forced to consider whether it's worth stealing fuel that is protected and easily identifiable, it also makes the fuel more difficult to sell on. Some haulage firms in the UK now use fuel dye specifically so any stolen fuel can be traced back to their companies, as fuel can be their biggest expense to their business and thus warrants being protected by any means.
- Ensuring that your premises have high quality security lighting that makes your fuel tank and vehicles visible to passers-by is a strong deterrent to an opportunistic fuel thief.
- You can also consider installing PIR Sensors and other types of security lights, these measures can quickly make a thief change their mind about targeting your tank.

CARAVANS and MOTOR HOMES – whether parked on your driveway or placed on a site, you need to think about your security there too; ensure that if you are leaving your caravan unattended for any length of time that you put all items away out of sight and that you have good sturdy locks on the towbar and also put a wheel clamp on one of the wheels..... make it as hard as you can for a would-be thief as they prefer “easy pickings”.

So, all of the above are guidelines for you to follow to keep yourself and your belongings safe and sound.

The month of June has seen us successfully employ our third new member of staff funded by the Woodsmith Foundation Grant. Louise Smith will be our new Funding Coordinator and will be responsible for seeking, and completing funding applications ready for submission with overview from me.

I have met with senior staff from Age UK and we are looking to hold one stop clinics with them regarding benefits advice, power of attorney, heating allowances etc.

We have taken part in the Keep Scarborough Tidy Litter Picking and will also participate in The Big Green Event which will include local school children to do a litter pick during the school holidays.

We attended Scalby Fair and provided an information stall about the work of the Council and The Hub. It was a great event for us to network not only with members of the Parish but with other professionals regarding the support groups we offer. We had a free prize draw with 4 significant prizes therefore that was a good attraction to the stall.

We had a wonderful afternoon in the Courtyard with entertainment from The Pickering Pop Ukulele Band. They were very well received by everyone who attended so I have rebooked them for a Christmas afternoon in December.

Groups 3 and 4 concluded their 10 sessions of Menopause Meet with a Graduation night and we are now looking to commence groups 5 and 6 in September, both of which are nearly full without even advertising. Miss Kavita Verma – the Gynaecology Consultant continues to be on board with our programme and attends every course – that's what makes our sessions so unique.

I met with North Yorkshire Learning who can offer many free courses in The Hub therefore I am working with them to create a programme of events on a regular basis.

Slimming World have given notice with regards to their group and will be moving to St Lawrences Church Rooms as they need a bigger room with an area for prams etc. We wish them well and will now look to fill this gap with another service.

I have met with one of the managers from MIND and again they can provide us with free courses regarding Mental Health. We will be offering a 6 week course and also they will now take part in the Menopause Meet programme.

Finally, I'm taking a coach trip to Scarborough Fair Museum near Filey on 27 July to look around the museum and for Afternoon Tea whilst listening to the Wurlitzer Organ. The original coach of 33 seats, had to be changed to 49 so I'm really pleased with the uptake for this.
